# TRANSFORMED LIVES ARE THE EVIDENCE OF GENUINE GOSPEL GRACE (3:1-3)

#### Verse 1

- "commending" introducing oneself for the first time
- Paul's opponents had stirred up dissension, causing many to have doubts about his reliability.
  - Human endorsement does not make Apostles; the empowerment of God makes Apostles.
  - Human endorsement does not make gospel witnesses; the power of God makes gospel witnesses!

# TRANSFORMED LIVES ARE THE EVIDENCE OF GENUINE GOSPEL GRACE (3:1-3)

#### Verse 2

- To start from the beginning with them would be the same as admitting that their gospel ministry among them had been flawed.
- The Corinthians should be affirming these missionaries as faithful servants of God and the church.
  - The gospel formed an indelible connection between the Corinthians and these missionaries ("written on our hearts").
  - The transformation the gospel made among them was evident to others who witnessed the fruit of the gospel among them ("known and read by all").
  - Paul and his associate have a letter a gospel founded local church in Corinth.
    - 1 Corinthians 9:1–2

## TRANSFORMED LIVES ARE THE EVIDENCE OF GENUINE GOSPEL GRACE (3:1-3)

- <sup>3</sup> And you show that you are a letter from Christ delivered by us,
- Jesus Christ has made His power and presence known in the lives of the people in the church in Corinth.
- Paul and his fellow gospel servants made liberating gospel truth known to them.
- written not with ink but with the Spirit of the living God, not on tablets of stone but on tablets of human hearts.
- The impression of the truth communicated to the Corinthians by Paul and his fellow ministers is supernaturally and spiritually significant.
- Nothing has changed they are still ministering the same gospel with the same anticipation of God's activity.

- <sup>4</sup> Such is the confidence that we have through Christ toward God.
- It is the Holy Spirits activity that grants confidence in gospel ministry.
  - Self-confidence in personal abilities, personality, competency, or popularity is not the substance of effective ministry.
  - In the face of our holy and righteous God, confidence must come from Jesus Christ.

<sup>5</sup> Not that we are sufficient in ourselves to claim anything as coming from us, but our sufficiency is from God,

- Once an arrogant Jewish Pharisee full of self-confidence, God has humbled Paul and caused him to be dependent on God's enabling grace.
  - Philippians 3:4–6
- Paul learned not to boast in the flesh.
  - Paul went to Corinth, shared the gospel, suffered, endured and established a church.
  - But Paul doesn't even take partial credit for his walk and ministry of faith.
  - The power is God and the glory is God's ("...our sufficiency is from God.")
    - 1 Corinthians 15:10

- <sup>6</sup> who has made us sufficient to be ministers of a new covenant,
- Paul now answers the question he asked in chapter 2.
  - 2 Corinthians 2:16
- New covenant life is a consistent demonstration of the Spirit's power and the presence of God.
  - Jeremiah 31:33

not of the letter but of the Spirit. For the letter kills, but the Spirit gives life.

- The "letter" represents God's truth as an external demand.
- The "Spirit" represents God's power that illuminates the truth, drives us to Jesus for forgiveness, empowering us toe understand and live the gospel.
- The letter only reveals God's truth; it does not inspire and empower obedience.
  - Galatians 3:21
- As he shares gospel truth with others, he is looking for the activity of the Holy Spirit to bring life, conviction, dependence and humble trust in the work of Jesus.
